
- 1. How would you define culture? What elements of your culture do you think are important?

- DC has a number of cultural centers, including the <u>Korean Cultural</u> <u>Center</u> in the Dupont Circle neighborhood. How does a cultural center differ from an embassy?



CULTURAL TOURISM DC

- <u>Take a look at this video</u> of a previous Passport DC event. What cultural aspects do you notice? What country's offerings are you most excited to experience in person?
- Cultural Tourism DC partners with Events DC for the <u>Embassy Chef Challenge</u>. How do you think food and drink creates "cultural diplomacy"?

SISTER CITIES

• <u>Search for your city</u> or a city you visited in the Sister Cities International database. How many sister cities did you find? Were there any sister cities that surprised you?

ETHIOPIA

- As discussed in the video, buna (the Ethiopian word for coffee) is made through a multi-step process, as shown <u>in this video</u> at DC's own <u>Sidamo Coffee & Tea</u>. How do you feel this ceremony adds to the experience of drinking coffee or building community?
- Staples of Ethiopian cuisine are discussed in the audio series, <u>Ethiopians in DC: Stories of Tradition and Culture</u>. How many foods do you eat that are part of your family's traditions?

EL SALVADOR

- The <u>DC History Center</u> in Mount Vernon Square has both online and in-person exhibits that preserve and illuminate Washington, DC's diverse residents. <u>Watch</u> their recent discussion on cultural identity for the Salvadoran community. Define "cultural identity" and explain how you maintain your cultural identity in your hometown.
- Check out this <u>pupusa cooking demonstration</u> from Audi Field's Chef Jocelyn. Try to make some at home! What ingredients would you use for your pupusa?

CHINA

- <u>Watch this video</u> on the Great Race story that inspired the order of Lunar New Year zodiac signs. <u>Read this article</u> to determine your Chinese zodiac sign.
- The gift of the Giant Pandas to the National Zoo helps to maintain the population of this endangered species. <u>Read this interview</u> with keeper Nicole MacCorkle, as she discusses caring for these amazing animals.

JAPAN

- The Bonsai museum at the U.S. National Arboretum includes a Japanese pavilion with gifts from Japan to honor the U.S. Bicentennial in 1976. <u>Take a look at this documentary</u> showing the original 53 bonsai trees that came from Japan to start the collection.
- While we covered many aspects of Japanese culture in DC in the video, there are more to be found on the <u>Japan Cultural Tourism trail</u>. Research one of the sites listed in the trail. Why did you choose that site?
